

The Church of Scotland: Changing Future

Response from Kirk Session to Presbytery

On 1 January 2023, our parish will become part of the Presbytery of Perth. Recently, the Kirk Session met to discuss the Consultation papers that had been circulated by the Presbytery of Dunkeld and Meigle Reappraisal Committee. This committee was interested in the makeup of our community, what buildings our church had, our working together with other Christian groups within our community, our links with other congregations in the parish and lastly how our congregation planned to address the Five Marks of Mission (see page 2). We also commented on the suggested linkages of congregations within our current presbytery area. Our responses have been forwarded to the Presbytery Clerk. This article is a summary of our report.

You might be interested to know that our parish of Fortingall, Glenlyon, Kenmore & Lawers (FGK & L) borders no fewer than 10 other parishes and 4 presbyteries! From the 2011 Census and Small Area Population Statistics from 2020, the numbers of people living within the parish was noted as 850, and that the elderly or very elderly population was increasing whereas there has been an ongoing reduction in young families, children of school age and young adults. The reduction in young families in the parish may, in part, be explained by the fact that nearly 40% of the local housing stock is either a holiday let or a second home.

We made an honest appraisal of each of our church buildings and the manse. We mentioned the continuing attempts to eradicate the dry rot in Kenmore Church and commented on the exterior painting at Fortingall Church and the internal repainting in Glenlyon Church.

Since there are no other congregations within our parish, we have not had the opportunity to work in this way but commented that we would welcome any opportunities that the new parish boundaries may offer the congregation to work with others to promote the life and mission of the church in the parish.

We have developed links with other congregations in other ways. The You Tube services during the Covid 19 pandemic were a case in point when we joined with the other churches in the Upper Tay Valley. The congregation participates in the Annual World Day of Prayer, hosting the service in rotation with other congregations, including the local Scottish Episcopal Church from one of the nearby parishes. Our congregation supports a Church of Scotland Guild where the meetings are open to non-members and frequently have visitors from other congregations who do not have an active Guild.

The Five Marks of Mission:

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom – very much the emphasis of our weekly worship on Sundays. Our churches are popular venues for weddings. Making our premises available for weddings and funerals is seen as part of our mission to the people of the parish – residents and visitors.
- To teach, baptise and nurture new believers – this presents a challenge given the demographics of our community, but there is outreach to the local schools.
- To respond to human need by loving service our small congregation has a history of generosity to charitable causes almost £2000 has been raised in the past 6 months; regular collections for the Perth Foodbank; Outreach activities of Church Newsletter and home visits when permitted.
- To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation

 the National Guild projects, which the

local Guild supports, seek to improve the lives of people both in the UK and overseas. Also, the congregation supported, prayerfully and financially, a member of our congregation who went to the Ukraine/Poland border to provide hot food to refugees.

5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth – the congregation has adopted a plastic-free environment at the post-service fellowship time, as well as using Fairtrade products. At Kenmore Church, the congregation has created a small garden and planted bulbs which bloom in the spring.

In general, the Kirk Session welcomed the possible allocations of congregations, placing FGK&L along with neighbouring parishes, mirroring the links that the local Medical Practice supports. We also supported the appointment of a minister to this extended parish, one of the two anticipated to be allocated to our current presbytery area. We did feel that it was important for the local community to be able to identify with their local church and a specific minister.
